To ensure that we can publish as much high quality research as possible, we have a strict policy of encouraging shorter, concise articles that report novel findings which are highly relevant to our scope and are likely to have significant international or national impact. We have two formats: **Full Papers** report hypothesis led research, in other words, a hypothesis must be presented and tested and the conclusions must clearly indicate whether or not the hypothesis was supported by the experimental results. **Research Communications** are of equal scientific merit and report high-quality hypothesis-led or descriptive research in a way that focuses attention on the novel findings. This is our preferred category for most research. For both types of article we strongly encourage the use of a Supplementary File to provide supporting information such as non-essential data and detailed methodologies. This file can be of any length and is published online linked to the main article. Providing a Supplementary File ensures that the main article is as concise as possible.

I am sorry, but we cannot consider your manuscript for publication in its present format. We are always anxious to help authors publish their research in the most appropriate and effective manner. However, we receive far more submissions than we can publish, so we have to be very selective.

Your manuscript needs to be revised and shortened before we can consider the scientific content. In particular, please:

- Use a Supplementary File if at all possible! This ensures that the main manuscript is as concise as possible
- State your hypothesis if you have one and clearly indicate whether or not it was supported. A hypothesis is normally essential for a full paper submission to JDR
- Focus your data presentation on the novel and significant findings and move any non-essential data to the Supplementary File
- Reduce the length of the Materials and Methods section, which should give an account of what was done without the detail needed for replication by others. That detail should be given in the Supplementary File
- Reduce the number of references (you have xxx) to the minimum essential number

Your manuscript does not comply with the requirements specified in our online Guidance and instructions to authors. In particular note that:

- Reference list is not in JDR house style and must be revised
- Tables and/or figures are embedded in text. This must be revised such that all data presentation is given after the reference list
- There is duplication of data between figures and tables
- English grammar requires improvement: please seek help from a native English-speaking colleague if possible

We hope that you will revise your manuscript and resubmit, but please note that resubmission in Research Communication format would increase your chances of publication. Please note that your manuscript has not been assessed for scientific quality. If you do decide to resubmit you should satisfy yourself that this is suitable for JDR, as indicated in our online guidance to authors.
